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The Certainty of the Gospel

If you ever go on a road trip with me, you will need to be prepared to listen to music from the '80s and '90s. One of the songs you will hear is from the band Powderfinger, who wrote the song "These Days". Although written in 1999, the lyrics speak to the uncertainty that many are feeling today in the face of a global pandemic. The chorus repeats like a lament:

These days turned out nothing like I had planned; Control well it's slipping right through my hand; These days turned out nothing like I had planned.

None of us could have imagined the days we find ourselves in. There are many things that seem uncertain today; it is hard to make plans when our days constantly feel unsteady and unsure. Amid uncertainty and in the face of suffering, the Apostle Paul asks an important question:

"Can anything separate us from the love of Christ? Shall trouble or hardship or persecution or famine or nakedness or danger or sword?" (Romans 8:35)

Paul answers his question with unswerving certainty:

"No, in all these things we are more than conquerors through him who loved us. For I am convinced that neither death nor life, neither angels nor demons, neither the present nor the future, nor any powers, neither height nor depth, nor anything else in all creation, will be able to separate us from the love of God that is in Christ Jesus our Lord." (Romans 8:37-39) Like Paul, I am convinced about the certainty of Jesus, the assurance of the Good News of Jesus and that nothing, not one thing, can separate us from the love of God and all that we have in Jesus.

For this reason, all of us at SUNSW are committed to making the Good News of Jesus known to children, young people, and families. It is the one thing we can be sure of.

Beach Mission leaders have great expectations as this year's summer camps kick off in NSW.

Adam Condie, who has been a leader at the Huskisson Beach Missions since he was in Year 10 in 2007, says he is "eternally grateful" that his parents took their family camping holiday at Beach Mission.

"It's just great having older Christians to look up to and see what it means to follow Jesus," says Adam, a primary school teacher who is now studying at Moore College in Sydney.

Now as a Leader, Adam said his excitement about Beach Mission comes from seeing God at work every year. Nathan Milham, SUNSW Missions Chair confirms that Scripture Union breaks down barriers with people because it's not associated with the institutional church.

"We're looking ahead to this summer with great expectation. You know, people are looking for good news, they're open to spiritual conversations. We have the best news. So now's the time to kind of embrace God's call to mission and give it a go.

"Even if people have gone away from the institutional church, which is the trend we see in Australia, they haven't gone away from a belief in a higher power or in a desire to pursue their own spirituality. "And this is the space that Scripture Union really thrives in because we don't have the image of the institutional church. We're just average everyday Christians - we're the mums and dads and uni students who actually believe this, and we come together under a neutral banner to have spiritual conversations."

Interview with John Dickson

John Dickson and his wife Buff, have had a long history with Scripture Union. Get a sneak-peak into their Beach Mission love story, what he loves about SU and his thoughts on the 'Certainty of the Gospel'.

We recently had the privilege of interviewing John Dickson, an Australian writer, speaker, academic, and public advocate for the Christian faith.

How did you first hear about Scripture Union?

My very first contact with Scripture Union was upon my conversion as a 16-year-old at Mosman High School. I'd never been inside a church and had no experience of Christianity. I became a Christian at school and soon discovered there was this weird thing called ISCF. I heard it was for Christians, and I'd just become one of those, so I went along! The group that I met with at ISCF were incredibly encouraging and became my first Christian community.

A little birdie told me that you met your wife serving on Scripture Union Beach Mission. Tell us a little bit more about that. Well, I was in a band and we used to get invited by the various Beach Missions that SU ran up and down the coast. One of those nights was at Evans Head up near Byron. The head of the teenager group at this Beach Mission was this gorgeous, unbelievably wonderful, articulate, godly woman.

I was introduced to her because she's the one who'd booked the band and wanted us to perform and preach the Gospel at Evans Head Caravan Park. This was Buff. And honestly, within about half an hour of meeting her, I said, privately, "Dear Lord, please, can I have this girl?" Terrible prayer – I don't advise it!

In those days, I was on the road nearly 10 months of the year, but we wrote letters backwards and forwards after meeting each other. Six months later it was clear that we liked each other so went on our first date. For Buff and her family, those Beach Missions were part of their regular pattern, for decades. For me to find my wife at Evans Head was obviously gorgeous! But I have an even older connection that I never even knew with SU. Buff's father had been the president of the New South Wales Scripture Union many years before I ever met them. So, SU is in Buff's blood in a big way and mine as well.

Scripture Union has a massive impact in sharing the Good News to young people. Is there an aspect of what SU does that you particularly love?

Well, I think I'm going to have to say TWO. One is that they are into the Bible. And they really are! They are Scriptural. And sometimes Christian organisations that have been around a long time can sometimes lose that. They drift. Not SU!

The other is they've always had this very down-to-earth approach to things, whether that's in state schools, doing the ISCFs or Beach Mission.

Going to where people are and trying to engage them in a way that points them to the truth of scripture.

What would you say to someone who's considering serving with SU?



Do it! You won't regret it because it's an organisation that is scriptural. You'll be drawn into a community that is, as I said, downto-earth, but also loving. I have nothing but high praise for the work of SU.

The theme for this Autumn Edition of SU News is on 'The Certainty of the Gospel'. I think this is a timely topic, particularly in this season where many things seem uncertain due to COVID. What would you like to say about the certainty of the Gospel?

Well, the opening paragraph of Luke's Gospel uses this word 'certainty'. Luke says: "Many have undertaken to draw up an account of the things that have been filled among us. Just as they were handed down to us by those who from the first, were eyewitnesses and servants of the Word. And since I've investigated everything from the beginning, it seemed good to me also, dear Theophilus, to give you an account of the certainty of the things you have been taught."

Luke uses this word 'certainty' intentionally. This word in Greek is 'asfáltos', which is the word we get asphalt from. The stuff you make roads out of, because it's solid stuff. And that's really what it means.

So, when Luke opens his Gospel this way, he's saying he wants them to know the certainty (the 'asfáltos') of the things you have been taught. How solid it is, how secure it is. It isn't so much about not having any doubts or having answered every question intellectually.

" When you know the Gospel, you end up knowing the most secure, the most stable thing in the world. And that is Jesus himself. You can rely on Him. He is the ultimate certainty.

What do you see as the possibilities of the impact that a movement like SU can have?

I think a movement like SU has the capacity to surprise people. Although I am a huge believer

in the local church, as I know SU is as well, church is a little bit on the nose for many Australians. Many Australians have a very low view of the church. It seems institutional.

SU is able to surprise because it's nimbler and more flexible. It's out there in the schools. It's doing the camps. It's out there on the Beach Missions, on the coal face, getting its hands dirty.

And I think SU can bypass the scepticism people have toward the institutional church, just by the very nature of its activity and ministry. And as people respond to it, SU can then point back to the local church and say 'that's a beautiful thing over there'.

John as we close off, I wanted to thank you for partnering with us with the Hope Project boxes. As you're aware, the Hope Project is an SUNSW initiative which is all about supporting, encouraging and sharing the Good News with students, predominately senior high students approaching their final HSC exams.

The response was overwhelmingly positive. It meant so much to individuals to know that in one of the most stressful times of their lives, someone was praying for them by name. Students were also blessed by their box of goodies delivered in the mail with your book 'A Sneaking Suspicion'. We're doing it again this year with the hope that Churches might also come alongside and partner with us in a big way. Thank you for joining us.

It was a privilege to be involved. It's great, just great, to be able to arm people with good resources to help them on their discipleship journey.

Ellie, a regular camper for 18 years at Brooms Head SUFM, shares how she came to meet Jesus when a leader asked her this simple question.

My name is Ellie, and I'm one of the regular campers at Brooms Head Caravan Park. I'm also one of the regulars to the Brooms Head SUFM Program. Believe it or not, I started going to this program 18 years ago now! I started out as a Minimite, but I've kept going all the way through until I was a Teen and as a Young Adult. When I first started attending the program, it was mainly for the fun activities and the messy games night. I also really loved meeting other people that were my age. More importantly, I really loved to learn about God and the Bible.

When I was going through the Minimite and the Keenite program, they'd often build the Bible lessons around a central memory verse. I was always trying hard to have the verse memorised before the end of the program. I even sent letters to some of the leaders halfway through the year, just to let them know that I still remembered the verse.

I remember one afternoon when I was about to start year 8. We had finished the afternoon activities in the Teens Program. I was talking to one of the leaders and she asked me this question: **What do you think about the Gospel?** I remember not knowing how to answer because I didn't really know what 'the Gospel' was. Of course, I didn't want to let on, so I played it cool and said, "Yeah, it's pretty good!" She saw straight through my response and began drawing on a piece of paper diagrams from the *Two Ways to Live* booklet and explained to me about Jesus and why Jesus had to die on the cross.

And at that moment, it all just started to make sense. Everything I'd learned from Minimites and as a Keenite and all the memory verses over the years. They all fell together.

I finally understood who God was and how He loved me. It was a few days later that I officially gave my heart to the Lord and I became a Christian.

I started to attend church and then a youth group. But every year, I always came back to SUFM because I got so much out of the programs. I became close friends with a lot of the leaders.

I was so inspired by the work that they did on Mission that I, in turn, was inspired to take on more leadership roles in my own church. I started working towards becoming a youth leader and even went on a few mission trips myself. All of which has left me so incredibly blessed.

•• One of the things that really stands out to me within my own testimony is how God uses even the littlest things to make a big impact in someone else's life. Little things, like sending a letter, or asking a question.


There will also be incentives along the way: various prizes when you reach a milestone on your quest to read 100 passages so you might be encouraged to persevere.
