




One week later, the team of 30 arrived in Narromine, while the other 20 remained behind to make day trips to Bulli so a beach mission could still take place.

There was no opportunity to advertise in Narromine prior to the team's arrival so they spent the first day door-knocking and building relationships in the community. The response was overwhelming!

Families came out in droves to the Movies in the Park, daily kids program, youth drop-in, inflatable water slides, and many other fun activities the community loved.

The Narromine Beach Mission was a resounding success for the team, the church, and the community as a whole. There are now plans to establish an annual rural partnership mission with the hopes to build a lasting relationship with the Narromine community.

This is an excerpt of the Eternity News article: "Love, Death, Grief, and Other Life Lessons this Summer." Written by Clare Potts, published January 11th, 2023.

"It's 11.14am on a Monday morning as we turn onto a small, paved road on the south side of Yamba, on the NSW North Coast.

Immediately the landscape changes. What were greengrassed nature strips and white weatherboard houses with frangipani trees in full bloom become sandy-dirt scrub, dunes and a littering of houses, some burnt down, others in a state of disrepair.

A sign passes on our left, painted with blues, blacks and red. This is Ngaru Villiage or 'The Mish' (short for mission) as it's known locally. It's one of two locations between Maclean and Yamba where communities of the Yaegl people live.

We park the car outside the first worn-down house. Myself and my two friends get out and exchange a nervous glance. We are all wearing identical t-shirts with the acronym HBC printed in block letters across them. It stands for *Holiday Bible Club*, a name that can only have been dreamt up by well-meaning Christians from the 1970s. Clutched in our hands are flyers we've cut ourselves the night before.

Every year in the week after New Year's, a group of Christians travel from Sydney to Yamba to run a week-long holiday program for Aboriginal kids of the Yamba and Maclean communities."

Think the usual stuff – a talk, games, craft, food, maybe a puppet here and there. While this would have seemed like hell-on-earth for 10-year-old me, the kids and their parents love HBC. Their reaction to our visit highlighted this.

As we walked up to the entry of the first house, we were greeted by a young woman warmly. "Oh, you are running this again! Yeah great!" As simple as that, she took our flyer and said she'd be sending some kids along. The next house was no different. A young woman and her mum were sitting on their porch with three dogs snoozing at their feet. The younger one recognised my friend. "Jazz!" As she looked at the flyer we handed over she beamed, "Oh bless you guys. I loved going to this when I was a kid."

As we wandered down the hill to the next house I said to my friend Jazz in astonishment, "They really trust us." She looked at me, a bit confused, and kept walking.

Jazz is a local here and grew up in Maclean. She's one of those rare people who genuinely doesn't buy into stereotypes. She's just present. She shows up."



Most importantly, the name of Jesus was celebrated. The Good News was shared in songs, guest speakers' messages, kids puppet shows, and in one-onone conversations. We praise God for the testimonies of people committing and recommitting their life to Jesus.

Plans are already underway for our next ONE Music Festival this November! We invite you to continue to pray for this exciting new venture - that God would be glorified, and that His hand will be guiding the volunteers involved.

Being different doesn't mean you have to miss out.

Spencer, 20, often struggled to fit in with his peers at high school. He has cerebral palsy and is unable to walk or speak. His only method of communication is through his computer. But every year while in high school, Spencer attended Dare 2B Different camp.

It was at this camp that Spencer found the love and acceptance he hadn't found in school. Spencer says,

I knew right away that this was a camp of loving Christians who do not walk away from a challenge."

Dare 2B Different is a unique camp for teenagers with varying forms of abilities, to participate in experiences that might otherwise be inaccessible. The ethos of this camp embodies unconditional love, inclusivity, and embracing each others' differences.

Our recent Dare 2B Different camp in December was no exception. Sixteen campers and sixteen leaders gathered in Campbelltown for a great week of adventure and making friends.

There were activities galore; from 'Moments of Madness' wide games to water activities, relays, archery, rock climbing, board games, and the giant swing – everyone got involved and had a great time! To top it off, campers and leaders enjoyed a bonfire to celebrate New Year's Eve together.

We also had the privilege of being joined by Joy Allen, one of the Founding Directors of Dare 2B Different camp.

Joy and her husband, Tom were always encouraged by the positive impact that SU camps had on their children's lives. However, Joy discovered there was no camp in their community specifically catered for teenagers with varying ranges of ability. Together with SU, they created Dare 2B Different to close that gap.

Joy says, "We love the unconditional acceptance and opportunity for growth for all people involved."

SU's camps are built on the premise of doing life together. True belonging is certainly found in being a part of God's family.




